PICTURE BOOKS

Hands Are Not for Hitting by Martine Agassi, 2002.

Picture Book AGASSI

Children who have been abused or witnessed abuse can mimic what they have seen. This book offers alternative solutions for dealing with anger and frustration. (Grades PreK-K)

Far Apart, Close in Heart by Becky Birtha, 2017.

Picture Book BIRTHE

Children who have a parent in prison express their feelings, and how they stay in touch through writing letters and visits. (Grades K-3)

Angryman by Gro Dahle, 2019.

Picture Book DAHLE

A young boy named Boj has a father who can be very angry and violent. When he is, no one is safe. Until Boj does something very powerful—he tells a trusted adult. (Grades 3-5)

The Big Bad Wolf in My House by Valérie Fontaine, 2021.

Picture Book FONTAINE

A young girl describes what it's like when her mom's new friend comes to stay. In the midst of the abuse the mother and daughter pair are able to cling to hope and safety. (Grades PreK-4)

Sad the Dog by Sandy Fussell, 2015.

Picture Book FUSSELL

"Sad" the dog's humans care for his basic needs, but often yell and criticize him. When his humans move away without him he is heartbroken until a new family makes his life complete. (Grades 1-4)

Still a Family by Barbara Reeves Sturgis, 2017.

Picture Book REEVES STURGIS

A girl and her mother stay at the family business shelter, and her father stays at the men's shelter. But they still find ways to come together as a family. (Grades PreK-2)

JUVENILE BOOKS

Louisiana's Way Home by Kate DiCamillo, 2018.

Fiction DICAMILLO

Louisiana's granny wakes her in the middle of the night and says they have to leave home immediately. Alone and stranded in a small town, she looks for a place to call home. (Grades 4-6)

Chirp by Kate Messner, 2020.

Fiction MESSNER

A young gymnast hides a sexual abuse secret as she makes friends in a new town.

Stay by Bobbie Pyron, 2019.

Fiction PYRON

Piper's family moves to a homeless shelter in a new city where she must learn to trust new friends to help her save a beloved dog, Baby, from being taken from her human. (Grades 3-7)

Ghost by Jason Reynolds, 2016.

Fiction REYNOLDS

Gifted runner Ghost finds his goals are challenged by his past with a violent father. (Grades 4-9)

Genesis Begins Again by Alicia D. Williams, 2019.

Fiction WILLIAMS

Genesis's family struggles to maintain housing, due to her father's gambling and alcohol abuse. A teacher uncovers a hidden talent in Genesis, and helps her learn to love herself. (Grades 6-9)

A group of animals share their experiences in being very scared, and how they reacted. They share both their initial reaction, and how they learned coping skills from grown-ups. (PreK-2)

Activities to help children process and heal from trauma-informed life events. (Grades PreK-3)

Free Lunch by Rex Ogle, 2019.

Recounting his lived experiences from sixth grade, Ogle chronicles the brutal consequences of poverty, violence and abuse inflicted on himself and his family. (Grades 5-8)

Let's Talk about Body Boundaries, Consent and Respect

Teaches the concepts of body ownership and appropriate body boundaries, respectful relationships, feelings and emotions, choices and recognizing bullying behaviors. (PreK-4)

Fiction BROWN

Believing that she and her mother are wizards helps Echo cope with poverty, hunger, her mother's drug abuse, and much more. (Grades 9-12)

If These Wings Could Fly by Kyrie McCauley, 2020.

Fiction MCCAULEY

Leighton struggles between her promise to watch over her sisters and her desperation to flee her father's on-going abusive behavior. (Grades 8-12)

Long Way Down by Jason Reynolds, 2017

Fiction REYNOLDS

Fifteen-year-old Will is tempted to avenge the shooting death of his brother—can a series of elevator interactions change his mind? (Grades 9-12)

My New Mom & Me by Renata Galindo, 2016.

Picture Book GALINDO

When he goes to live with his new cat mom, a puppy is nervous and unsure. But Mom knows how to take care of him and they learn how to be a family together. (Grades PreK-2)

Real Sisters Pretend by Megan Dowd Lambert, 2016

Picture Book LAMBERT

Mia and Tayja are sisters even though others don't always recognize this since they're adopted and don't look alike. Safe in the knowledge that adoption has made them "forever family," the sisters go on a pretend adventure and end their make-believe journey with a joyful homecoming to a real home with their two moms. (Grades PreK -2)

A Family Is a Family Is a Family by Sara O'Leary, 2016.

Picture Book O'LEARY

When her teacher asks everyone to share what makes their family special, a young girl is reluctant to speak. Then she learns from her classmates that there are many, many types of families, and every type is just as loving and valid. (Grades PreK-2)

The Family Book by Todd Parr, 2020

Picture Book PARR

A celebration of all the different kinds of families in the world, the different things they might like to eat and the things they have in common. (Grades PreK-2)

We Belong Together by Todd Parr, 2007.

Picture Book PARR

An adoptive parent and child celebrate the reasons why they belong together, and the many things that they each bring to the relationship. (Grades PreK-2)

Home at Last by Vera B. Williams, 2016.

Picture Book WILLIAMS

After Lester is adopted from his foster home by Daddy Albert and Daddy Rich he is happy during the day, but too scared and worried during the night to sleep in his own bed. Finally, the family dog comes up with a solution that helps Lester feel at home at last. (Grades 1-3)

JUVENILE FICTION

Forever or a Long, Long Time by Caela Carter, 2017

Having shared so many foster homes that they are unable to trust that the family that has adopted them will last, Flora and her brother, Julian, are assisted by their new mother on a journey to resolve their past so that they can build a future. (Grades 3-7)

I Can Make This Promise by Christine Day, 2019

Fiction DAY

Twelve-year-old Edie finds letters and photographs in her attic that change everything she thought she knew about her Native American mother's adoption. She realizes she has a lot to learn about her family's history and her own identity. (Grades 3-7)



For Black Girls Like Me by Mariama Lockington, 2019

Fiction LOCKINGTON

After moving across the country, eleven-year-old Makeda, who is adopted and black, is coping with serious problems in her white adopted family. Through it all she can't help wondering: What would it be like to grow up with a family who looks like me? (Grades 3-7)

Patina by Jason Reynolds, 2017

Fiction REYNOLDS

Patina's mother lost her legs to "the sugar," so she and her little sister live with a friend of the family who adopted them. Patina struggles to adjust to her fancy new school but as long as she can look out for her younger sister, whose braids she takes special care of every Sunday, things will be okay. (Grades 5-9)

TEEN FICTION

Far From the Tree by Robin Benway, 2017

Three teenagers, biological siblings separated by adoption, explore the meaning of family in all its forms--how to find it, how to keep it, and how to love it.

NON-FICTION

I Color Myself Different by Colin Kaepernick, 2022

J B K116i

After being asked about why he is the only brown person in his family when he draws a picture for a school project, Colin starts to feel bad. After talking with his mom about how being adopted made their family whole, he celebrates how being adopted and having brown skin makes him special.

My Family, Your Family by Lisa Bullard, 2015.

Makayla explores her neighborhood and spends time with all different types of families. Each family is happy and loving, and the differences between them are described as positives. (Grades PreK-3)

Family and Friends by Honor Head, 2013.

Describes different types of families, including foster families and how they are formed. Provides advice for having healthy relationships and questions to think about. (Grades 2-5)

Families by Shelley Rotner and Sheila M. Kelly, 2015.

Numerous photographs and simple text describe all different types of families – what is different, and what they have in common. (Grades PreK-2)

Wemberly Worried by Kevin Henkes, 2000.

Picture Book HENKES

Wemberly, a mouse, worries about everything, including her first day of school. (Grades PreK-2)

A Whale of a Mistake by Ioana Hobai, 2020.

Picture Book HOBAI

A girl makes a big mistake and worries that it will impact the rest of her life. She swims out to sea with her "whale of a mistake" where she discovers how to learn from it and let it go. (Grades K-3)

Brave Every Day by Trudy Ludwig, 2022.

Picture Book LUDWIG

Camila learns how to be brave in the face of worries when a class visit to an aquarium brings anxiety and fear. (Grades K-3)

Ruby Finds a Worry by Tom Percival, 2018.

Picture Book PERCIVAL

Ruby is a happy and curious girl who one day finds something unexpected: a Worry. Every day the worry gets bigger until she learns from a friend how to make the worry go away. (Grades PreK-2)

JUVENILE FICTION

Every Missing Piece by Melanie Conklin. 2020.

Fiction CONKLIN

Since her dad died in a terrible accident, Maddy has worried a lot. She conducts frequent safety checks and constantly calls the police. A new boy in town is cause for concern. (Grades 3-6)

Five Things about Ava Andrews by Margaret Dilloway, 2020.

Fiction DILLOWAY

Everyone thinks Ava never talks because she is stuck up. What they don't know is that she is quietly trying to deal with two troubling problems—anxiety and a heart disorder. (Grades 3-6)

Fiction REYNOLDS

Portico copes with "the frets" through his secret identity as the superhero Stuntboy. (Grades 3-6)

Guts by Raina Telgemeier, 2019.

Get Up, Stand Up by Cedella Marley, 2020

Picture Book MARLEY

Children are encouraged to resist bullying and stand up for their rights. (Grades K-2)

I Walk With Vanessa by Kerascoët, 2018

Picture Book KERASCOET

An elementary school girl witnesses the bullying of another girl, and decides to stand up for what is right. (Grades PreK-3)

My Footprints by Bao Phi, 2019

Picture Book PHI

Upset after being bullied, Thuy, a Vietnamese American, pretends she is different creatures, including an especially strong, wonderful being made up of her two mothers and herself. (Grade K-3)

The Not-So-Friendly Friend by Christina Furnival, 2021

Picture Book FURNIVAL

How to Set Boundaries for Healthy Friendships

A kind hearted girl who is quick to make new friends discovers that not every classmate will like her. She learns to set boundaries and stay emotionally safe from school bullies. (Grade K-3)

Speak Up Sami by Shabana Hussain, 2022.

Picture Book HUSSAIN

Sami is a shy boy who has trouble making friends at school. Sometimes the other kids tease Sami making him choose to be quiet and distant from others at school. It is when a new kid, Gamba, starts school and is bullied that Sami knows he can't stay quiet anymore. (Grade K-3)

FICTION

American as Paneer Pie by Supriya Kelkar, 2020

J Fiction KELKAR

When a racist incident rocks her small Michigan town, eleven-year-old Lekha must decide whether to speak up or stay silent, even as she struggles to navigate her life at home, where she can be herself, and at school, where she is teased about her culture. (Grades 4-7)

Black Brother, Black Brother by Jewell Parker Rhodes, 2020

J Fiction Rhodes

Donte is a biracial boy in a school that is mostly white. He is relentlessly bullied by classmates who wish he looked more like his light-skinned brother. Donte uses the sport of fencing to stand up for himself and challenge school bullies. (Grades 4-7)

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Farah Rocks Fifth Grade by Susan Muaddo Darraj, 2020

J Fiction DARRAJ

Fifth-grader Farah's world is turned upside down when new girl Dana shows up and starts bullying her younger brother Samir. Determined to handle it on her own, Farah comes up with a plan--a plan that involves lying to those closest to her. (Grades 3-5)

Mia Mayhem vs. the Super Bully by Kara West, 2019

J Fiction WEST

Mia is excited about her first super-speed training class, but a bully on her relay team leads her to lose her shadow and, worse, to snap at her friends. (Grades 1-3)

The Secret Battle of Evan Pao by Wendy Wan-Long Shang, 2022

J Fiction Wan-Long Shang

Evan Pao is trying to find his place in a new city as a Chinese-American. Kids at his school are determine to not let him fit in to the point of violence. Evan has to make a choice. Will he move forward with the same cruelty or find his own path? (Grades 4-7)

NON-FICTION

Buckets, Dippers, and Lids: Secrets to Your Happiness, 2018 by Carol McCloud J 177.7 M127b

This book uses a charming metaphor to help children achieve healthy relationships. It also introduces ways that children can set boundaries when they are faced with negative peer interactions. (Grades K-3)

Channel Kindness: Stories of Kindness and Community by Lady Gaga, 2020 T 361.2 Gag
Young people tell their stories of how they overcame bullies and mistreatment. This book emphasizes that simple acts of kindness and empathy can make big changes to the world around us. (Grades 7-12)

TEEN

Friend Me by Sheila Averbuch, 2020

T Fiction AVERBUCH

Roisin just moved from Ireland to Boston where she faces intense bullying from a new classmate. Roisin is able to feel better by chatting with an online friend who she later doesn't know if she should have trusted. This gripping thriller explores topics in bullying and cyber-safety. (Grades 8-12)

This Might Hurt a Bit by Doogie Horner, 2019

T Fiction HORNER

Relates a seriously bad day in the life of Pennsylvania teenager Kirby Burns, in which he faces dangerous classmates, discovers that a friend is hiding a terrible secret, and grapples with the one-year anniversary of his sister's death. (Grades 9-12)

The New David Espinoza by Fred Aceves, 2020

T Fiction ACEVES

Obsessed with the idea that he is not muscular enough and tired of being bullied, David, age seventeen, begins using steroids, endangering his relationships with family and friends. (Grades 9-12)









Death and Grief

Ida, Always by Caron Levis, 2016. Picture Book LEVIS

Gus the polar bear grieves over the loss of his companion, Ida. This story is inspired by the real-life Gus and Ida of New York's Central Park Zoo. (PreK-3)

The Rabbit Listened by Cori Doerrfeld, 2018. Picture Book DOERRFELD

When Taylor's block castle is destroyed, all the animals think they know just what to do, but only the rabbit quietly listens to how Taylor is feeling. (PreK-2)

The Goodbye Book by Todd Parr, 2015. Picture Book PARR

A fish is sad that his friend died. This is a very simple colorful book for young children to learn basic feelings about grief. (PreK-2)

Maybe Tomorrow? by Charlotte Agell, 2019. Picture Book AGELL

Elba carries the black block of grief and sadness wherever she goes--until Norris comes along and helps her to let go of the block and enjoy life again. (PreK-3)

The Invisible String by Patrice Karst, 2000. Picture Book KARST

Liza and Jeremy's mother teaches them about the Invisible String, which connects people who love each other no matter where they are and means that they are never alone. (PreK-3)

Goodbye Bear by Jane Chapman, 2022. Picture Book CHAPMAN

After Bear dies, Beaver and Mole go through stages of grief, eventually deciding to finish something that Bear had started. (PreK-3)

Dance Like A Leaf by A. J. Irving, 2020. Picture Book IRVING

As her grandmother's health declines, a young girl begins to take the lead in their shared autumn traditions (PreK-3)

Zara's Big Messy Goodbye by Rebekah Borucki, 2021. Picture Book BORUCKI

After seven-year-old Zara experiences a death in her family, she learns that being sad can look different for different people.

The Boy and the Gorilla by Jackie Azúa Kramer, 2020. Picture Book KRAMER

An imaginary gorilla helps a young boy talk to his father about the loss -- and find a path to healing through their shared grief and bond.





JUVENILE FICTION

My Father's Words by Patricia Maclachlan, 2018. Juvenile Fiction MACLACHLAN Two children are left without their father after a terrible accident. Their father's words guide them through overwhelming grief and give them hope for the future. (Grades 3-7)

Stars Beneath Our Feet by David Barclay Moore, 2019. Juvenile Fiction MOORE
Unable to celebrate the holidays in the wake of his older brother's death in a gang-related shooting, Lolly struggles to avoid being forced into a gang himself while constructing an elaborate LEGO city. (Grades 5-6)

When You Trap a Tiger by Tae Keller, 2020. Juvenile Fiction KELLER.

When Lily and her family move in with her sick grandmother, a magical tiger straight out of her halmoni's Korean folktales arrives, prompting Lily to unravel a secret family history (Grades 3-7)

Repairing the World by Linda Epstein, 2022. Juvenile Fiction EPSTEIN.

Grieving over the sudden death of her best friend, eleven-year-old Daisy finds it hard to get excited about things, but new middle school friends and supportive family members help Daisy discover a way to move forward. (Grades 3-7)

Shot Clock by Caron Butler, 2022. Juvenile Fiction BUTLER.

After the death of his friend, Tony gets the chance to join the basketball team as statistician. He must grapple with honoring the memory of his basketball-loving friend while also trying to fit in on the team. (Grade 3-7)

NON-FICTION

Lost in the Clouds by Tom Tinn-Disbury, 2021. J 155.937

Billy misses his mother and learns, alongside his father, how to understand and deal with their emotions surrounding loss. (Grades K-3)

My Mixed Emotions by Elinor Greenwood, 2018. J152.4 G816n

Feelings can be complicated and learning to express them is a skill that must be developed. This book coaches children through a variety of emotions and situations, including grief. (Grades 1-5)

Feeling Sad by Amber Bullis, 2020. J 155.4124 B978f

In this book, readers will discover how to recognize sadness in themselves and others, how to best respond to it, and how to communicate about these feelings. (Grades K-3)

Death Is Stupid by Anastasia Higginbotham, 2016. J155.937 H635d

This forthright exploration of grief and mourning recognizes the anger, confusion and fear that we feel about death. This book is an invaluable tool for discussing death, but also celebrating life and love. (Grades K-3)

"When somebody dies,/where do they go?" This poem explores death through simple but evocative questions. (Grades K-3)

After Ivan's parents separate, he has trouble finding joy at either of their homes until he discovers that the birds and music that he loves may be found in both places. (Grades K-2)

Mila and the Monsters by Judith Koppens, 2021

Picture Book KOPPENS
